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UMPSA receives delegates from NPO Turkiye and MPC

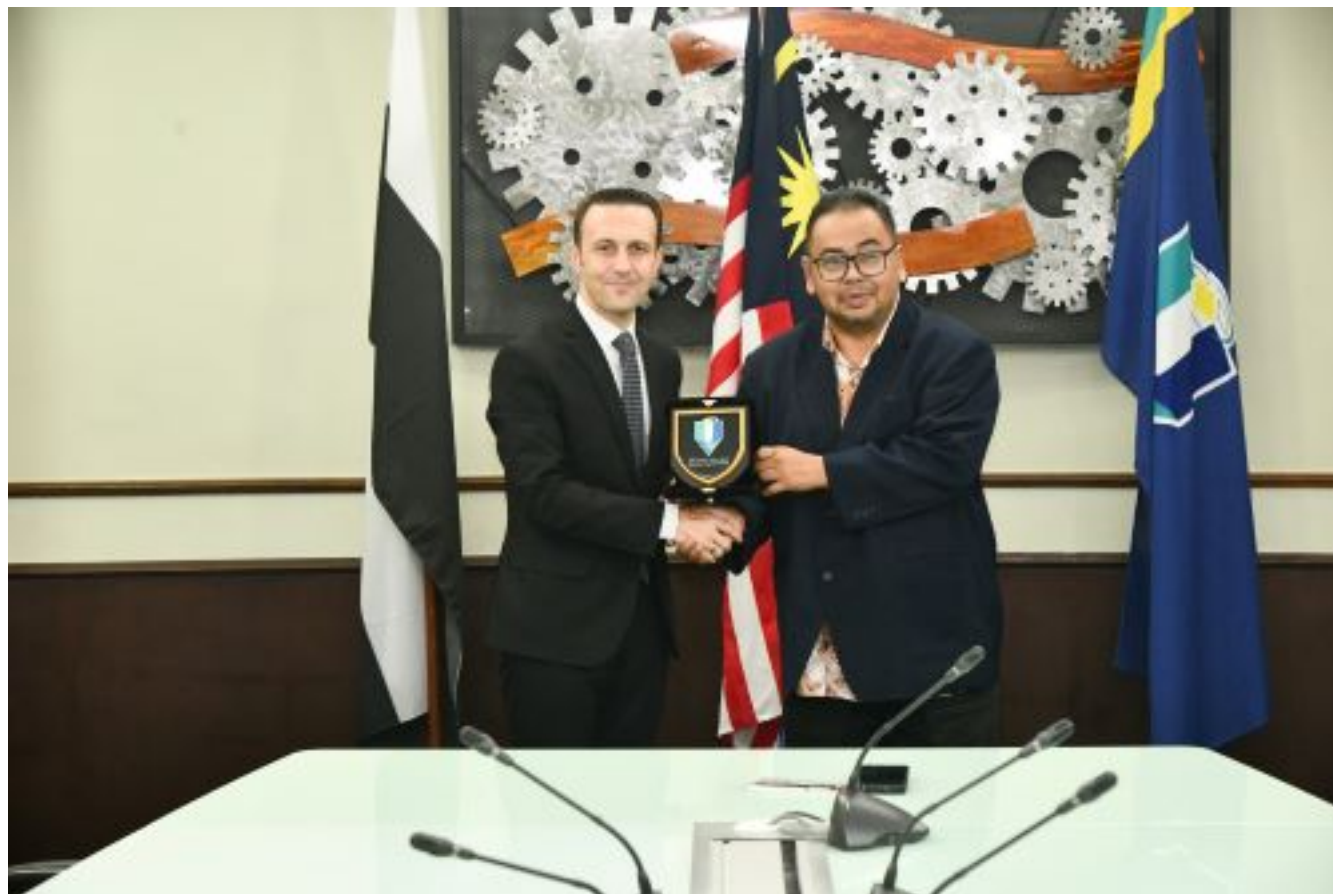

"It is based on the industrial environment, as well as forging cooperation in various aspects, including student placements for industrial training, research, and more.



One of the main goals of establishing a factory on campus is to expose students to the real industrial world.

Through learning in this factory, lecturers can provide theory while simultaneously demonstrating to students the practical use of equipment in a situation similar to being in the industry," he said.

Through this visit, both parties can exchange information regarding the concept of operating a learning factory in practice.

The 'Model Factory' in Turkiye serves as a centre for training industrial workers on techniques and methods to solve problems and increase productivity.

Meanwhile, UMPSA's learning factory focuses more on a real industrial-based learning environment.

During this two-day programme, the delegation visited the learning factories, namely the Manual Operation Learning Factory and the Smart Operation Teach Factory, located at UMPSA's Gambang Campus on the first day.

On the second day, they had the opportunity to visit the Bosch Modular System and Mechanical Learning Factory, which are learning factories located at UMPSA Pekan.

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
