## International students created new memories celebrating Ramadan at UMPSA

In addition, the international student society from Yemen, known as the Yemeni Student Union (YSU), organized an iftar gathering on March 30, 2024.

Other than sharing various traditional Yemeni foods during iftar, they also performed Isyak and Taraweh prayers together, then ended with light refreshments.

Other than that, UMPSA's international students also did not want to miss the chance to experience breaking their fast together at Majlis Bandaraya Kuantan 1 (MBK 1) field.

The field is located in front of Masjid Negeri Sultan Ahmad, and it is a famous gathering place for people in Pahang to come and break their fast together.

They expressed their appreciation and happiness as they have also been given the opportunity to interact with the Top Management of UMPSA through an iftar event with His Royal Highness Tengku Hassanal Ibrahim Alam Shah ibni Al-Sultan Abdullah Ri'ayatuddin Al-Mustafa Billah Shah, the Crown Prince of Pahang.
